In addition to what we are experiencing now is the uncertainty of what comes next.

Many times, after a traumatic event, we have an opportunity to plan and implement a recovery plan – a roadmap back to normalcy or at least some sense of normal. The current situation leaves us wondering what comes next, how do we respond, and will we ever return to what we thought was normal. Or, as some seem to be projecting, we may face a new normal – whatever that is.

I don't have answers to those questions, but I do offer some reassurance to our community: the Hamilton Community Foundation remains a community leader of philanthropy and stands ready to respond to the changing needs of our community. Since our creation in 1951 the Hamilton Community Foundation has helped see our community through traumatic events. Wars, financial collapses, natural disasters, national problems and local issues have been addressed by the Hamilton Community Foundation through the generosity of our donors.

Beginning several months ago, the Foundation began to prepare to respond to the local effects of the Covid-19 pandemic. We partnered with the Butler County United Way, the Greater Cincinnati Foundation, United Way of Greater Cincinnati and other funders to establish a regional recovery fund to support area non-profit organizations experiencing extraordinary need as a result of Coronavirus. Funding of up to \$450,000 was made available to organizations providing direct services to our neighbors in Butler County.

As we move forward, we are working on a plan to assist our community organizations as they navigate their future. The Hamilton Community Foundation will be ready to provide support to respond to new and existing community needs. Just as we have done for nearly 70 years, we will meet this challenge and make a commitment to lead the philanthropic response to the community.

These are indeed extraordinary times and they demand an extraordinary response. The Hamilton Community Foundation is poised to provide that response. We are able to do that today as we have done since 1951 because of the generosity of our donors. Now more than ever we need your partnership and support. Nearly \$450,000 Granted for Coronavirus Relief

Meeting community needs Emergency Money Fund on the frontline

Debbie Smith faced a difficult situation this winter. She had seven family members living in her Hamilton home, including three adults who had lost their jobs. Her utilities were about to be shutoff, but the Emergency Money Fund helped her through the crisis.

"We live in a two-story brick home with little insulation, and our utility bills were very high in January and February, and the City of Hamilton was going to shutoff service," Smith said. Fortunately, Hamilton City Schools Success Liaison Gina Walters learned about the issue while checking up on Debbie and her 15-year old granddaughter and began researching whether she could qualify for emergency help. Success Program of Butler County Educational Services work closely with needy families, and she's grateful the Emergency Money Fund is one of the options she has. "If someone mentions they're facing a utility cutoff or they've received a three-day notice for being late on rent, I'll talk with them to learn about the circumstances that put them in this situation," Walters said.

If the family appears to be in a one-time emergency situation, they can qualify for help. "The committee overseeing the Emergency Money Fund is very diligent about ensuring these funds are used wisely," Walters said.

For several years, EMF was offered through Saint Raphael's. But

"I initially thought Gina was going to get me some extra time so I could use my next check to pay the utility bill, and I was just stunned to find out it had been paid," Smith explained. The Emergency Money Fund, managed by the Hamilton Community Foundation, paid \$458 of her utility bill.

Walters and other school liaisons in the

when that agency closed, some new board members helped restructure the program so it could be managed by the Hamilton Community Foundation. HCF Finance Vice President Dan Sander is now on the EMF board. "His knowledge has been a Godsend to us," said Butler County Success Director Cari Wynne, a member of the volunteer EMF board. BCESC receives \$3,500 a month during the nine months of the school year,

and Wynne said Butler County Success provides case management to identify families in need. The program also works with other social service agencies and specialists like mechanics to help split the cost of assisting families.

"I think our board is open to a variety of needs, but I would say what we see most commonly are issues with rent, utilities, car repairs or medical expenses," Wynne explained. "We have some new board members who are very compassionate about this cause, so we've really revitalized the program."

Wynne emphasizes the Emergency Money Fund is not for people who are chronically unemployed and in frequent financial distress. "What I like about our eligibility criteria is that it's meant for people who are experiencing a hardship that has placed them behind," she said. "This is designed to be a once a year type thing with the idea that with EMF's support, the family can sustain itself from there."




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
Youth Philanthropy Committee holds virtual meeting to award grants
